About Lent...

My personal approach to Lent has gone through wild swings over the years. I was raised in an Anglo-Catholic parish where prayers, fasting, mid-week services & vigils were the norm for many parishioners. My earliest practices and disciplines were shaped in that community even during my college years. It was in those seasons of intended piety that I first thought I might become a monk. I should note that I was dating Barbara at the time and she thought it was not a very credible idea. It turned out that I did not have a monastic vocation.

Going to seminary in low-church Virginia re-shaped my Lenten practices. Fewer mid-week services but still marked by giving things up – smoking, desserts and the like. I don't know that I gave a lot of attention to why I did those things. It was simply in the rhythm of my year. I might have supposed that in some minuscule way it was an imitation, or at least an echo, of Jesus' forty day fast in the wilderness.

And then came the 1979 Prayer Book and the Liturgy for Ash Wednesday (BCP p. 264). The first time I read the Litany of Penitence, I felt as if someone had read my mind and exposed my worst personal traits to the world.

"We confess to you, Lord, all our past unfaithfulness: the pride, hypocrisy, and impatience of our lives, We confess to you, Lord.


Our self-indulgent appetites and ways, and our exploitation of other people,

We confess to you, Lord.

Our anger at our own frustration, and our envy of those more fortunate than ourselves, We confess to you, Lord.

Our intemperate love of worldly goods and comforts, and our dishonesty in daily life and work, We confess to you, Lord

Our negligence in prayer and worship, and our failure to commend the faith that is in us, We confess to your Lord."



My heart pounded at those words and they re-charged my understanding of Lent as a time of interior reflection and self-understanding. For a long time my focus was much less on giving something up and more on sitting quietly listening for some holy presence.

Taking on a practice seems to fit well into my current listening for the heartbeat of God. I encourage you to read a book like <u>Walking in Wonder</u> by John O'Donohue, or go to <u>www.episcopalchurch.org</u> and look at <u>The Way of</u> <u>Love</u> as a resource. You will be surprised at how warmed your heart might be.

Into the Night: Portraits of Life and Death, is a two-hour documentary, featuring fascinating, unexpected voices from various walks of life: old and young, believers and nonbelievers, the dying and the healthy, well known and obscure.



Into the Night creates a safe smart place that allows people to talk about a subject of universal importance. It is the conversation we yearn to have, but too often turn away from in fear and distress. Yet our culture is at a critical turning point, driven in part by the baby boomer generation that is insisting on a new openness and on this deeper conversation. Our film speaks to this emerging movement with a novel approach meant to provoke searching conversations, both private and public.

Ultimately the film is meant to raise questions, not to provide answers. How could it? Death is "that undiscovered country," as Hamlet so famously described it, "from whose bourn/No traveler returns."

Piedmont Child Care Center (PCCC)

The Piedmont Child Care Center is one of Trinity's oldest and most successful Community programs. It has been on it's own since moving to the new facility in 2000. The Center is open five days a week and the building is currently filled with about 50 children, six weeks to about seven years of age. There are five different classrooms and three play-grounds; all age appropriate. The Infant Room leads into the Green Room with it's 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 year olds. Then the Yellow Room goes from 2 1/2 to 3 1/2. As they move around the Center the next stop is



the Red Room 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 and finally the Blue Room for the Pre K group. We also have a Purple Room that takes care of the kids that come off the school buses and are there during the summer.

The children are served breakfast, a morning snack, lunch and an afternoon snack. Every child, in every classroom, takes a nap in the afternoon. The kids are out on the playground two times a day; morning and afternoon. It really is a wonderful place and the classrooms are staffed with terrific, caring, nurturing teachers. Do stop over and have a look, it really is a magical place where amazing things happen every day. Join us for a sphagetti supper fundraiser here at Trinity, Friday April 3rd from 4:30pm - 6:30pm.

Plans are underway for the 2020 Hunt Country Stable Tour taking place over Memorial Day weekend, May 23rd and 24th.



Notes from Christian

We begin this season of Lent with a focus on the Wesleys, of Methodist fame. John and Charles were among the 18 children of an Anglican cleric and became Anglican priests as



well. While both brothers were actively involved in the Anglican movement know as Methodism that ultimately led to the United Methodist Church, it is John who is credited as its founder. Charles' legacy became the over 650 hymn texts he penned, many of which have become among the most beloved and well-known hymns ever written. Charles' son Samuel Wesley was something of a musical child prodigy studying the violin and organ and was often called the English Mozart. He went on to be an extremely gifted organist and composer. Samuel's son, Samuel Sebastien Wesley, was given Bach's middle name by his father and became a cathedral organist and perhaps the most successful composer of the family. It is his anthem "Wash Me Throughly" that the choir will sing on the first Sunday of Lent, March 1.

The Feast Day of John and Charles Wesley is the first Tuesday of Lent, March 3, and we will be discussing their hymn texts at the Lenten Series that same evening. In preparation for that event I give you John Wesley's directions for singing which have appeared at the beginning of every Methodist hymnal yet published and despite their somewhat dated language, are as relevant now as they were when written in 1761.

I. Learn these Tunes before you learn any others; afterwards learn as many as you please.

II. Sing them exactly as they are printed here, without altering or mending them at all; and if you have learned to sing them otherwise, unlearn it as soon as you can.

III. Sing All. See that you join with the congregation as frequently as you can. Let not a slight degree of weakness or weariness hinder you. If it is a cross to you, take it up and you will find a blessing.

IV. Sing lustily and with good courage. Beware of singing as if you were half dead, or half asleep; but lift up your voice with strength. Be no more afraid of your voice now, nor more ashamed of its being heard, than when you sung the songs of Satan.

V. Sing modestly. Do not bawl, so as to be heard above or distinct from the rest of the congregation, that you may not destroy the harmony; but strive to unite your voices together, so as to make one clear melodious sound.

VI. Sing in Time: whatever time is sung, be sure to keep with it. Do not run before nor stay behind it; but attend closely to the leading voices, and move therewith as exactly as you can. And take care you sing not too slow. This drawling way naturally steals on all who are lazy; and it is high time to drive it out from among us, and sing all our tunes just as quick as we did at first.

VII. Above all sing spiritually. Have an eye to God in every word you sing. Aim at pleasing him more than yourself, or any other creature. In order to this attend strictly to the sense of what you sing, and see that your Heart is not carried away with the sound, but offered to God continually; so shall your singing be such as the Lord will approve of here, and reward when he cometh in the clouds of heaven.
